

# Taming The Giants - Journeying Beyond Jealousy

Jealousy – that green-eyed monster that transforms even the most gentle into a greedy, self-centered, deceitful person. We hate it, we hate what it does to us, and even what it does to others. Yet, we often find ourselves journeying through periods of time wrapped in its clutches, believing that if only we "had what they had" life would be better. Although the words *jealousy* and *envy* have different shades of meaning, for the purpose of this lesson we will interchange them, for the heart behind them and the effect of acting in them is the same. May the Lord use this lesson to take you beyond *jealousy* in your journey towards being more like Jesus.

#### **DAY ONE:**
