

Tamíng The Gíants - Fíghtíng Your Fear

Fear. Just about everyone has struggled with this debilitating emotion sometime in their life. The spirit of *fear* can take over your life and dominate you in a way that God never intended. If it is not God's intention, then there must be a way of victory. God's intentions for us always provide for God's enablement to us. May you learn from this study how to fight your *fear*, and, in the fighting, discover that *fear* has lost its grip, because you have put your hand into the One who grips much better.

DAY ONE:

- 1. The words *fear* or *afraid* are used over 500 times in the Bible. What does it say to you that God refers to *fear* so often?

- 3. Genesis 3:10 records the first use of the word *afraid* in the Bible, quoting Adam just after his sin with Eve. What did Adam say?
 - a. This *knowledge* promised by Satan (see Genesis 3:5) resulted in a distorted viewpoint of God that has been carried on throughout each generation. Considering his statement, what do you think Adam's perspective of God was?

DAY TWO: Read Deuteronomy 31:1-8

Then Moses went and spoke these words to all Israel. ²And he said to them: "I am one hundred and twenty years old today. I can no longer go out and come in. Also the LORD has said to me, 'You shall not cross over this Jordan.' ³The LORD your God Himself crosses over before you; He will destroy these nations from before you, and you shall dispossess them. Joshua himself crosses over before you, just as the LORD has said. ⁴And the LORD will do to them as He did to Sihon and Og, the kings of the Amorites and their land, when He destroyed them. ⁵The LORD will give them over to you, that you may do to them according to every commandment which I have commanded you. ⁶Be strong and of good courage, do not fear nor be afraid of them; for the LORD your God, He is the One who goes with you. He will not leave you nor forsake you."

⁷Then Moses called Joshua and said to him in the sight of all Israel, "Be strong and of good courage, for you must go with this people to the land which the LORD has sworn to their fathers to give them, and you shall cause them to inherit it. ⁸And the LORD, He is the One who goes before you. He will be with you, He will not leave you nor forsake you; do not fear nor be dismayed."

- 1. Using verses 3-5 underline what God told Moses He would do for the people when they crossed over the Jordan. Now, list those things.
- 2. The Israelites were not without their own responsibilities. What were they? Verse 6
- 3. According to verse 6, why would the Israelites be able to be courageous?
 - a. This promise is referred to in Hebrews 13:5. It is encouraging to know that God was not only promising His presence to the Israelites, but He promises never to leave any of His children. How does the promise of God's presence help you in times when you are afraid?

b. What are some other things you need to know about God that help you to not be afraid?

DAY THREE:

- 1. Joshua learned well from his mentor, Moses. In response to Moses' words in Deuteronomy 31, what did he tell the people in Joshua 1:9?
 - a. What do you think would have happened if Joshua's faith would have faltered and he failed to follow Moses' example?
 - b. As believers, we also have responsibility to obey the One we claim to follow (Jesus). What might be the effect on others of our giving in to our *fears* rather than believing God?
- 2. God not only understands our *fears*, but He is the answer for them. He not only tells us not to be afraid, He also gives us reasons why we can relinquish our *fears*. Today we will look at some of those reasons. From the following verses, underline or highlight the words or phrases that tell us why God is saying, *Do not be afraid*.

Genesis 15:1 After these things the word of the LORD came to Abram in a vision, saying, "Do not be afraid, Abram. I am your shield, your exceedingly great reward."

Genesis 26:24 And the LORD appeared to him the same night and said, "I am the God of your father Abraham; do not fear, for I am with you. I will bless you and multiply your descendants for My servant Abraham's sake."

Exodus 20:20 And Moses said to the people, "Do not fear; for God has come to test you, and that His fear may be before you, so that you may not sin."

2 Chronicles 20:15 And he said, "Listen, all you of Judah and you inhabitants of Jerusalem, and you, King Jehoshaphat! Thus says the LORD to you: 'Do not be afraid nor dismayed because of this great multitude, for the battle is not yours, but God's. "

Nehemiah 4:14 And I looked, and arose and said to the nobles, to the leaders, and to the rest of the people, "Do not be afraid of them. Remember the Lord, great and awesome, and fight for your brethren, your sons, your daughters, your wives, and your houses."

Proverbs 3:25-26 Do not be afraid of sudden terror, nor of trouble from the wicked when it comes; For the LORD will be your confidence, and will keep your foot from being caught.

Isaiah 12:2 Behold, God is my salvation, I will trust and not be afraid; 'For YAH, the LORD, is my strength and song; He also has become my salvation.' "

Isaiah 41:10 Fear not, for I am with you; Be not dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you, Yes, I will help you, I will uphold you with My righteous right hand.'

Isaiah 44:8 Do not fear, nor be afraid; Have I not told you from that time, and declared it? You are *My* witnesses. Is there a God besides Me? Indeed there is no other Rock; I know not one.' "

Jeremiah 17:7, 8 Blessed is the man who trusts in the LORD, and whose hope is the LORD. ⁸For he shall be like a tree planted by the waters, which spreads out its roots by the river, and will not fear when heat comes; but its leaf will be green, and will not be anxious in the year of drought, nor will cease from yielding fruit.

Matthew 10:31 Do not fear therefore; you are of more value than many sparrows.

Mark 5:36 As soon as Jesus heard the word that was spoken, He said to the ruler of the synagogue, "Do not be afraid; only believe."

Luke 12:32 Do not fear, little flock, for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom.

Revelation 1:17 And when I saw Him, I fell at His feet as dead. But He laid His right hand on me, saying to me, "Do not be afraid; I am the First and the Last."

DAY FOUR: Read 1 Chronicles 28:20

And David said to his son Solomon, "Be strong and of good courage, and do it; do not fear nor be dismayed, for the LORD God--my God--will be with you. He will not leave you nor forsake you, until you have finished all the work for the service of the house of the LORD."
