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Taming the Giants - Impeding Ingratitude

FIRST DAY:

The psalmist wrote in Psalm 33:21, *our heart shall rejoice in Him, because we have trusted in His holy name.* Pause and meditate on some of the many attributes of God. Choose a few of them and share why you rejoice in and are thankful for each of those attributes of our God.

SECOND DAY:

- 1. As you reflect on the names of God, take a moment and share what the Lord has taught you as you have studied His attributes.
- 2. Look up the following verses and share what you discovered about rejoicing in who God is:
 - a. Psalm 5:11
 - b. Psalm 9:10
- 3. What does 1 Thessalonians 5:18 teach about giving thanks?
 - a. Consider the most difficult problem in your life today. What do you find in this to give thanks for?
 - b. How does knowing the character of God and trusting in His name enable you to be thankful in *everything*?

THIRD DAY:

1. *Bless the LORD, O my soul, and forget not all His benefits* (Psalm 103:2). Read through this psalm and list the things the psalmist is thankful for:

- 2. David was a man of many blessings, both spiritual and material. Yet, according to Psalm 103, what kinds of things was he thankful for?
 - a. In what way might you apply this psalm when you are feeling down and ungrateful?
- 3. What does the phrase abounding therein with thanksgiving (Colossians 2:7c) say to you?
 - a. What helps you to do this?

FOURTH DAY:

- 1. Scan Psalm 106:1-25 paying particular attention to verses 7, 13, 25. Why was the wrath of God kindled against Israel?
 - a. What do the following Scriptures say about murmuring and complaining?

1 Corinthians 10:10

Philippians 2:14

- 2. Observe and record the consequences of not being thankful from Romans 1:21.
 - a. "The beginning of man's rebellion against God was and is the lack of a thankful heart." This is a prevalent malady in our nation. Apparently our country has often suffered this affliction. Glimpse this in the fourth paragraph of the Thanksgiving Proclamation (see last page). Summarize the problem.
 - b. What do you think is the basis for a lack of gratitude or murmuring?

- 3. The opposite of murmuring is praise or thanksgiving. What does Hebrews 13:15 say about this?
 - a. How can we apply this verse in practical terms?
 - b. Think of a time that you chose to praise the Lord when you did not feel like it. What was the result?
 - c. "The bird sings not because he has the answer, but because he has a song." What are some of your favorite songs of praise?

I do therefore invite my fellow citizens in every part of the United States, and also those who are at sea and those who are sojourning in foreign lands, to set apart and observe the last Thursday of November as a day of Thanksgiving and praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the heavens.
